Our bit of history...

A Railroad in the Works 1867

New Orleans *Daily Picayune*, Thursday, June 6, 1867

PASS CHRISTIAN AND THE RAIL-ROAD There has been much talk of building rail-roads; but the only one now certain to be built within a short space of time is that which will go from New Orleans to Mobile via the watering places, and thence to Chattanooga. The preliminary surveys are now in progress, and the earth will be broken with a large force as soon as this is so far completed as to indicate the path the workmen are to take. Apart from the ultimate commercial ad-vantages of this road to the city resident desirous of a home out of the reach of our dust and noise, this opens a most hopeful vista. Pass Christian — delightful, breezy, dry, with its airy shades and lovely dwellings, will then be only an hour and a half distance from New Orleans. The man of business who, after an early breakfast, starts from his home along the beach at the Pass, can by leaving at 7 reach the city at half past 8, and leaving again at half past 3 be ready for his dinner at 5. Three hours of the day he may spend along the way, but they will be pleasantly employed in observing the world outside the city, or in meditation, for which few business men get time, or in conversation, and not illy spent, when they separate him from his business cares. The rest of his time will be in the country, along the beach, angling

perhaps, perhaps bathing in the salt water, and slumbering in the cool and pure air, made fragrant and musical by the coquetting of the breeze with the pine boughs. We mention Pass Christian especially because it has ever been the favorite watering place, where the finest mansions were built, where society was always unexceptionable, where the best schools abound, where churches are well established and supported., and because it has a progressive and intelligent population. No doubt those who have secured themselves comfortable homes with the sole expectation of visiting their families, once a week during the summer, are now greatly rejoiced to find that they will, within a year, be able to be with them every night, and lose hardly an hour from the time they give, even in winter, to their business. 45
